

## The TCRC Auction Has Finally Arrived! Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>

The biggest and best R/C Airplane event in the upper Midwest will be happening on Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>. The 45<sup>th</sup> Annual TCRC Auction will be held at its normal location in CrossPoint Church at the intersection of France Avenue and 98<sup>th</sup> Street in Bloomington, Minnesota.

The TCRC Auction attracts buyers and sellers from all over Minnesota and the surrounding four states. Because of the COVId-19 pandemic, this grand event had to be cancelled in 2021 and postponed to April 30<sup>th</sup> in 2022, but now it is back! It is anticipated that because of the delay since the 2020 TCRC Auction, there should be more items for sale and more eager buyers to purchase those items.

The Auction is an all-day event, with the doors opening up at 6:45 AM for buyer and seller registration. The items for sale are held in an impound area, which opens for inspection at 8:15 AM, and the first item on the auction block is at 9:00 AM. In prior years, the auction then goes non-stop until approximately 5:00 PM when the last item is sold. Admission to the auction is only \$5/person, which is a very cheap price for an entire day of continuous action.

TCRC always has a concession area operational during the auction. You can start your day with coffee and a roll and enjoy lunch and snacks all thru the event. Food and beverages are not permitted in the seating area but there is a dining area by the concessions with a good view of the auction activity.

If you have items for sale, you can pre-register those items by downloading a 'sellers inventory card' at TCRCOnline.com. You will be assigned a seller's number and receive instructions as to completing the pre-registration process.

### **River Report**

TCRC must always keep an eye on the water level of the Minnesota River in Jordan to know if there is going to be any spring flooding which obviously can have an effect on our Jordan flying site.

Right now, as of April 1<sup>st</sup>, the Minnesota River at Jordan is at a height of 12 feet. Most of the winter it was down around 7 feet, but then rose to a crest of 13.84 feet last week as a result of the warmer weather we had which reduced the snowpack on the ground considerably. Since that time, with the cooler weather, the River has been dropping to its current level of 12 feet.

At 18 feet, the River starts to rise onto our field.

As of now, NOAA has not made any projection as to the River's rise as by the snow continues to melt. be Hopefully, when they do start to make he their projections, the snowpack that affects the river level will have all melted and they will not be projecting (2) any flooding in the Jordan area. The reason for this is we will be using an auction software that is used by Shareif Eisa, the auctioneer who helped us out two years ago, and will be working the auction again this year. It should make things easier and speed everything up. The software has been used for ten years but is new for us this year. I'm looking forward to seeing how well it will help the auction.

At the membership meeting on April 12<sup>th</sup>, we will discuss the software and do a demo to show how it works and how it can help us.



At the TCRC physical meeting, Tim has his laptop there and sets up a camera so those in the Zoom meeting can see those in attendance.


This has worked well, and the members appreciate having the option to attend a meeting when it is inconvenient to be there physically.

Larry Couture had a Competition, a low-wing stick that he created by mixing and matching parts from other planes he had lying around. This plane was from parts of three others. The wing was covered in yellow Monokote and the fuse was down in red. It was powered with a Magna 70 4-stroke engine. The wingspan was 58-inches and it weighed in at 5-pounds. As of the meeting the stick has not had its maiden flight.

Larry also had a second mix-and-match plane at the meeting. This high-wing aircraft had the fuse from an Aerostar and a wing with a slight amount of dihedral. The wing was done in red with yellow sunrays. The wingspan was 62-inches and it weighed in at 5-pounds. The engine was an AS 46 2-stroke. This plane also has not yet had its maiden flight.

Sherwood Heggen utilized the miracle of modern communications to bring the club his newest plane, a 1941 old timer which he built from plans. Miss Tiny had a wingspan of 46-inches with a whole bunch of dihedral. The plane weighed in at 25 ounces. It was covered in dark red Monokote and had white striping on the fuse. He said the plane from 80 years ago wound have been gas-powered but his had an EFlite 370 electric motor. He has not yet put the maiden flight in on this classic, but should do so sometime early this spring.



## Antoinette Latham 'Monobloc'

The March Mystery Plane was the French Antoinette Latham 'Monobloc'.



In 1911 an already existing airplane, heavily modified, made its debut. This was the 'Monobloc'. It was a 3-seat, low-wing monoplane, with the crew completely enclosed in the 'cockpit'. In order to obtain maximum performance, every effort was made to streamline, including completely hiding the landing gear, and putting all control cables in the wings.

The lane was skinned in aluminum, covered with linen. Now, in the early days not much was known about power-to-weight ratio, and with an all up weight of almost 3,000 pounds, and only 50 horsepower, it was no wonder the plane never flew higher than a few feet!

After considerable redesign, there was still really no successful flights, and further work was ended.

The Antoinette had a wingspan of 52-feet, 10-inches and a weight of 2,976 pounds. It was powered with an 8-cylinder liquid-cooled inline engine that developed 50 horsepower.

Here it is April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022, and the weather is cool but the sky is sunny. I have been at the field this spring. There was a nice weekend, and I flew Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Then the weather turned crappy and March finished that way. But today looks good again and the field did not flood.

I like to fly electric airplanes in this cooler weather, and it seems to be the choice of many others also.

The most problem with the electric motors is that they start without noise and at only one or two clicks above off they can be at a speed to nick you and cause spots of red on fingers and such. So, one must be very careful when moving the plane after it is turned on and ready to fly. Some like myself use the thumb-on-stick approach and others use binders or other locks on that throttle stick. Whatever is your method make sure to use it all of the time. Also make sure your clothing does not have lose strings or flaps, as propellers are very quick to pull in and grab things like that and can cause very serious accidents.

The building season is for all practical purposes over and my hands and such are clear of glue and paint which is a great feeling in itself, and all cuts and scrapes have healed. I kept all my fingers and such out of the bandsaw and jigsaw and I hope you all did the same. Injury-free makes for a great building season.

Thought for the day: Keep the rubber side down and all landings are not perfect but if you can fly again, they are great. Have fun and keep flying.
