March was a great month for the TCRC online store! We had donations from club members account for twenty sales between online auction and local marketplace ads totaling just over \$2,300! That is an amazing single month total!

Some of the buyer's favorite items are high-end transmitters, four cycle engines, and bicycle parts. You did indeed read that last one correctly -- bicycle parts are in high demand right now and the items we received generated over \$500 dollars in sales themselves. We do not need to sell RC specific items to generate funds for the club, so if anyone has shippable items of some value that are not RC related let me know and I will try to get a few dollars for the club out of them!

For the most part the feedback from buyers has been overwhelmingly positive so we are generating many happy customers from the items everyone has been donating. All of that positive feedback helps to attract additional buyers and give bidders confidence that they will receive the product they are envisioning when they place a bid. In the long run this will help us to get top dollar for the items everyone donates. There has been a single instance of a dissatisfied customer who left a negative comment in the feedback section after receiving an item and having made no attempt to reach out to have an issue resolved. This

is an extremely difficult situation to manage as eBay goes to great lengths to protect buyers, and values their satisfaction above all in order to keep them within the community. I am very happy to say that after a lengthy appeal process eBay has sided with TCRC and has agreed to remove the comment that buyer placed in the feedback section! That alone is a pretty significant victory, but the process continues to see if the score can be stricken as well. Again -- the better our reputation the higher the bids we receive!

In total the store has generated \$3,234 dollars in sales and of that \$2,968 is profit for the club. \$310 dollars of that has been local market sales and the rest has been eBay sales. The eBay store has a 91.8% profit margin while local channels have a 91.6% profit margin. Note the eBay sales generate slightly higher profit margins than local sales despite paying a fee to the site for listing, and that is due to the fact that eBay collects sales tax in addition to the sale. Also, buyers pay retail shipping rates and eBay then gets a discount that is passed to the seller.

I am extremely pleased with the success of the store and continuously impressed with the generosity of the club members and your willingness to donate items to help support the club. Jordan Field Report

Brian and I were at the field on Sunday, March 28th. We had been flying two weeks before and, at that time, the field was really squishy and the ground slimy. You could tell that the frost was just coming out of the ground. However, there was no standing water and it appeared as though the drainage ditches dug last year were working.


Fast forward to the 28th, after three days of rain that made the river level go from 11 ft to 16.8 ft. I was expecting the field to be really soggy, but I was wrong. The field was completely dry. You could see cracks in the soil on the infield and could tell that it had dried out nicely after the frost went out of the ground. Even after the intensive rain, the field wasn't slimy or slippery. The ground was the same firmness as my yard in Minneapolis. The only water to be found was on the runway, in the middle of the X where the pavement had sunk, and on the parking lot.

The parking lot had standing water on it and was a bit soft under the truck tires but not when walking across it. The culverts under the driveway were all open and had been working as expected. The driveway was firm and only rutted at the entrance.

Overall, I think the field looked the best it has looked at this time of the year since I became a member of the club.

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Looks like some nice flying weather is on its way. Maybe we can luck jet fuel it's alright for gasoline. You out this year. Hope to see some new planes at the field this summer.

Finishing up on last month's article, I will be talking about finishing your new pride and joy.

There are so many ways to put a finish on a model, so I will talk about the radio and go flying. what I would be doing, which is fiberglassing and painting. I would be using some type of 2-part epoxy that I would thin down a little with acetone or denatured alcohol to a creamy consistency. Using 3/4oz. glass cloth. Start in the middle and work out from there. make sure everything is covered well. Now here's the next step which is like a miracle. With the epoxy wet and uneven on the surface, just put down a product called PEEL PLY. You will see that it's on top of the wet fiberglass and looks to be getting wet and becoming part of the fiberglass. Don't worry it's not. When all the epoxy is dry just take the PEEL PLY and pull back on itself. This product is designed to come off and leave a slightly textured surface, but very smooth. The textured surface is from the weave of the PEEL PLY, it's like Dacron dress lining fabric. Now just a light sanding and you are ready to spray or roll on primer. The PEEL PLY doesn't work as well on curved surfaces as a flat surface, so you may need to put the material down in smaller pieces. As a side note, you can use dress lining material, but it has to be 100% polyester not a blend. If you get a blend it will not work, trust me! There is an article in RC Scalebuilder by Marmburst on putting this down using 100% polyester fabric.

Panel lines are done after the first coat of primer is sanded. Layout the lines on the model with a ruler and pencil. Then use a product called 1/64in Chartpak tape or fine-line tape. Put the tape over the pencil lines and spray another coat of primer on making sure to cover the tape well. After it dries sand the primer and especially on top of the tape until you see the tape appear. Stop, don't sand anymore of the tape, now peel the tape off. You will see there's a small groove left which is your panel line. There may be some adhesive residue left from the tape, but you can clean that out with mineral spirits. It's actually very easy to do.

Rivets are done a few ways, but I've used a syringe and canopy glue, like RC-56. Don't have to thin and you can do vertical surfaces it won't

run. The rivets are put on after the final sanding and just before you spray color on. As soon as the color goes on the panel lines and rivets will just jump out, it's very exciting.

Now you are ready for your final step in color. You can use a multitude of products. Some that I have used are Klass Kote epoxy paint, Stits products, similar to dope or lacquer, or even latex paint. Although latex is not fuel proof to glow fuel and maybe can use Klass Kote clear over the latex to fuel proof the surface.

I've given a brief summary of the finishing I do. Now you can install

Always Wear An Orange Vest To Retrieve A Plane

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Every member is reminded to wear an orange vest if your plane goes the wooded areas down in surrounding the runways.

If your airplane does go down in the woods, the orange vests are quite close. The orange vests are stored in the rafters of the shelter and easy to reach.

Be safe! Where an orange vest anytime you have to retrieve an airplane. \odot

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Show & Tell





He said the parts were printed on rough-cut wood and each part had to be cut out with a jigsaw. When done, the almost 80-year old plane will have a 109-inch wingspan and weigh in around 9 pounds. It will be powered with a Magnum 61 4C.



Steve Meyer had a Miles Sparrow Hawk made by Seagull Models. This 1935 racer was done in red monokote with silver wings and had been converted to electric. It had a 71-inch wingspan and weighed in around 11 pounds. He bought the kit at a TCRC auction and built the plane for his wife Sandy. The spats for the wheels were really neat looking.

Jafety At The Field

Here it is the last day of March 2021. The last few weeks have been the coldest I can recall. I have not been to the field so I cannot give you any information on flying there. The action for me has been here at the hangar. I finished one more plane. I got a Tiger 60 which was under construction from Bobby, and finished building it two day ago. Had fun with the air retracts as I had never done any of those before. I had to call Steve Meyer two times to get info and, by golly, with that and the book that came with them they are now working, so miracles do happen.

So, for a safety article I will use what just happened to me so you can do it yourself. When drilling the holes in the fire wall for putting on the engine mounts, do not buck the back off the firewall with your finger in the wrong place because it hurts a lot when the drill finishes the hole.

The next item is to be very careful when removing the key on a Futaba servo wire end to fit in another brand of wiring. That also can hurt.

Now I cut almost all my wood parts by power tools such as jig saw, band saw or rotary tool. And to date I have not cut my fingers by any of these tools, but believe me I have seen fingers removed or badly damaged by these tools -- so be very, very careful when using them as they cut extremely fast through body parts.

Now getting down to the upcoming flying weather, be sure to double to have hand sanitizer present at their and triple check all flying surfaces and batteries in your airplane before table. your next flying session as the gremlins are always at work when you're not looking.

So, when you go flying have fun and keep the rubber side down when landing, and all landings in which you can fly again are great but not always graceful.

TCRC Swap Meet on May 22nd

Messerschmidt 263 A

The March Mystery Plane was the German Messerschmidt 263 A.



Most everyone who is interested in WWII warplanes is familiar with the rocket-powered ME 162 'Komet'. Bomber killer, a killer to pilots and bombers alike.

A follow up to the 163, was the 263. Devised directly from the 163, it was a greatly improved plane. Appreciably cleaner, it featured a blown canopy, retractable landing gear, and greater fuel capacity. The fuel consisted of T-stoff and C-stoff, highly explosive. A pressurized cabin, plus 12 and 20 mm armor for the pilot, it still used mostly wood for the fue and tail feathers.


Original flights were unpowered with gear fixed in down position. Rather than nose-mount missiles, it was equipped with 2-20 mm cannon, 75 rounds per gun. The maximum speed was estimated at 620 mph. Endurance was 13 minutes at 20,000 feet, 15 minutes at 36,000 feet.

Preparation was made for full production at the time of Germany's capitulation. The 263, if production had been reached, would have made a great impact on the bomber swarm then over Germany. No 263 saw combat.

The ME-263 had a wingspan of 31-feet, a combat weight of 11,700 pounds and a speed of 620 mph. The engine was a Walter HWK, bi-fuel rocket that developed 4,430 pounds of thrust.



TCRC 2021 Membership Renewal

(Editor's Note: At the December 8th TCRC Zoom Meeting the dues for 2021 were discussed. Following that meeting, Treasurer Tim Wirtz emailed the membership their official renewal notice on December 16th. The following is a copy of the Renewal Statement that every member should have received in their email.)

TCRC 2021 Renewal Statement

This is your official 2021 TCRC Club renewal notice. Before your renewal application can be processed by TCRC, your 2021 AMA Membership must be current. A 2021 Membership Card will not be issued until the AMA website shows your AMA status as current. Your 2021 AMA Membership status will be verified using an AMA website application. There is no need to submit a paper copy of your AMA Membership status with this application.

To serve the TCRC Membership, the Board requires a signature of each pilot confirming their intent to abide by the Field Rules that are posted on the TCRC website, TCRCOnline.com and in the shelter at the main field. This year, due to COVID, your payment of your yearly dues constitutes your acknowledgment that you intend to abide by the Field Rules

TCRC Membership types are as follows:

- **Regular:** Those 19 years or over as of July 1, 2021
- **Family:** Regular member plus all son(s)/daughter(s). Pilots under 19 years of July 1, 2021 must have a current 2021 AMA Membership
- Junior: Those under 19 years as of July 1, 2021 (who are not part of a Family Membership)
- Social Affiliate: An affiliate of TCRC with no flying privileges (*does not require AMA Membership*)

The 2021 Membership Dues are listed below. Receipt of payment is proof of renewal. NO NEED TO PRINT AND SEND THIS FORM


