Jim Ronrovde had a Marlin ARF manufactured by Arrows Hobby. The sweptwing foamy had a 35-inch wingspan and weighed in at 2.3 pounds. It was done in white with blue rim and powered by an electric ducted fan. As of the meeting, the plane had not had its maiden flight.



Joe Neidermayr had an ARF Tucan manufactured by Multiplex. The plane had a 52-inch wingspan and weighed in at 3-1/2 pounds. It was done in a gray camouflage pattern that Joe had painted using house paint. The plane was powered by an electric Turnigy motor and a 4-cell 2,700 mah lipo. He had also put in retracts from a Freewing T-33. As of the meeting the Tucan had not had its maiden flight.



Larry Couture had an Ultra Stick he had built around an Ultra Stick wing he had laying around. The plane had a 58-inch wingspan and weighed in at 6-3/4 pounds. It was done in yellow Monokote with white wings and a red/white checkered horizontal stab. It was powered with a Saito 80 four stroke engine. He had also added flaps. The plane had a wingspan of 8-feet and weighed in at 17 pounds. It was TBD powered with a Super Tigre 3000 two-stroke engine. Sherwood had covered it with silver Ultrakote. Sherwood said that Bob had done May 9 an incredible job of building the Bathtub. The spoked wheels were taken from an old laundry cart and covered with fuel hose for tread. It May 9 also had torsion rods in the landing gear. This was the third Bathtub Bob had constructed – one of which was on floats. Sherwood says the May 13 maiden flight will be this spring.

Minnesota River Report

The National Weather Service finally started making has predictions on its NOAA website for the water level in the Minnesota River at Jordan. Up to this time, they only would say, "The overall risk for flooding this spring is WELL ABOVE NORMAL along the mainstream of the Mississippi River. The Mississippi tributaries across southeast Minnesota and southwest Wisconsin have NEAR to ABOVE NORMAL chances for flooding this spring."

On March 26^{th} , the Minnesota River at Jordan climbed to 17 feet, and then receded to 12.5 feet on March 30^{th} . But from that time on, the River has climbed back to 17 feet on April 2^{nd} , and is projected to crest at 21.1 feet on April 6^{th} . After that crest it is supposed to slowly recede.

TCRC's Jordan Flying Site stays dry until the Minnesota River reaches 18 feet. At that time the water just starts to reach the shelter. The current projection puts about 3 feet of water on our field. As the snow continues to melt, and with usual April showers, we can expect that our flying site will be closed through the month of April.

The Scott County Fairgrounds is TCRC's alternate flying site and will be open for flying through the month of April.

Well Spring should be here soon and time for flying, but more than likely our field will be flooded for hopefully a short time. So, in that case we have the Scott County Fairgrounds to fly, and one of our first events will be the float fly at the main beach at Bush Lake Park in Bloomington. This event is open to any AMA member, airplanes only, and coordinated by Steve Meyer. Steve does a great job of running the event and everyone has a great time. Thanks Steve! We usually get 20-30 guys with various styles of float planes flying. It's a low key, fun way to fly a model off of water. For Nate and I we have a couple of float planes that are just dedicated to flying off the water. Makes it easy to get things ready.

Remember if you are adding floats to your plane, there are specific ways to mount floats with regards to the CG, propeller, length of the floats and width between the floats. So be careful setting up your model.

At the April meeting there will be a program on floats and float flying. Our float fly will be in May. So, you still will have time to get your plane ready for the float fly. If you have never flown off of water, you need to. Watching the plane get up on the step and rise off the water with drops of water trailing behind is so neat to see. The landing is just as serene, watching the floats slowly come down to the water and once touching just rocks back to come to a slow bobbing action in the water. It's so relaxing to see. Make sure you don't miss the float fly on May 13th. The snow should be (better be!) gone and it won't affect our flying at the lake, other than the water being higher.

Remember, get those planes ready, batteries ready, fresh fuel ready, and fingers crossed for light winds, no rain, and sunny skies.

So, get to the April 11th membership meeting to see a great program on float planes and float flying!

Curtiss X 15 C-1

The March Mystery Plane was the Curtiss X 15 C-1.



After the war, the U. S. Navy was interested in mixed power for a carrier-based fighter and specifically a proven recip engine and a turbo jet.

Three prototypes were ordered from the Curtiss Aircraft Company. In Zoom meeting, and furnishes the link 1944 the planes were to use a proven R-2500 recip engine and a 2700 shaft horsepower Allis Chalmers turbo jet.

The first X-15 flew on February 27, 1945, but it crashed on a landing approach on May 8th. The second prototype plane then flew on July 9, and the third shortly thereafter. The first plane had conventional rudder and horizontal elevators, but #3 had a T-tail, and the planes were successfully flight tested in October, 1946.

At this point the Navy lost interest and cancelled the contract. No idea how much was spent. Also, the speed of the combo was considerably lower than the majority of the WWII fighter planes, the P-51, the F-6F, the Spitfire, etc.

The Curtiss X-15 C-1 had a wingspan of 48-feet, a gross weight of 16,631 pounds and a speed of 432 mph. The engine was an R 2800 18cylinder radial.
