The meetings for August 14<sup>th</sup> and September 11th are also scheduled for the Jordan field.


In case of rain or bad weather, but not high water, the meeting will be held at its normal time of 7:00 PM at CrossPoint church in Bloomington. J

It's already July and not much flying is getting done with all this rain, wind, heat and our field being flooded. Hopefully some of you are using the fairgrounds or another field. I can only go on the weekends and there has been one good weekend in the last 5 for me to go flying. I'm a member at the SMMAC club, so I have flown in Owatonna at Tim Johnson's field. That's where a lot of guys with giant scale and/or jets fly.

This month I was going to talk about not necessarily pattern flying, but more about precision flying. I know, you are thinking I just want fly and not worry about that. That's okay, but here's a question you might want to ask yourself. Am I flying my plane or just reacting to what the plane is doing? Think about when you do a loop or roll, do you just peg the aileron stick and roll or just pull up elevator and loop which is okay, or can you line yourself up with the pattern and do your roll so the midpoint is in front of you, instead of waiting for the plane to pass and the rolling your plane, or looping your plane with the center of the circle in front of you. I know that starting a roll before it gets to you can feel a little uncomfortable, but that's the whole idea, because once you have mastered that you can feel that you accomplished something, and also learned to control your model a little better. I know when I try something new I will make sure I think about it before I'm even in the air and once airborne plan on doing that maneuver a little higher up, we use to say 2 mistakes high.

Going back to the roll, practice from both directions. Typically, you do a roll downwind because from the ground it gets stretched out and looks better, just like a loop looks better flying upwind. Okay back to the roll, the other element to add is when you are upside down add just a small amount of down elevator to maintain your altitude. For a while it may not look pretty but you will get it.

So, you say I just want to fly in circles or a racetrack pattern, practice maintaining your altitude throughout the turn. When it comes to landing try a rectangular type traffic pattern. Start downwind then turn to a base leg then to final and get a nice descent going and just hold the elevator where it is. Do this every time. If you're short just add a little power or if you're too high just decrease your power trying to maintain the same

elevation. Once you can do that it makes landing a lot easier. That's how you land a full-size plane.

Remember in the end have fun.

## Mitsubishi F1M2

The June Mystery Plane was the Japanese Mitsubishi F1M2.



In 1934, Japan, probably anticipating its attack on the U.S.A., ordered a ship launched observation biplane. The design program was assigned to Joji Hattory. Her produced a very neat plane. It featured an all-metal oval fuselage, and all-metal wings. To keep it aerodynamic, he restricted the interplane struts and limited the rat's nest of flying wires. It was engine with an 820 horsepower radial.

The initial plane had rather severe stability problems, which included Bob's planes range from small marked snaking, and tended to auto rotate. Joji redesigned it, gave it 3 electric ARF's up to 1/3-scale sport degrees more dihedral, enlarged the vertical stab 85%, the rudder 30% planes. Some planes are still in kit more and lengthened the main float. The wings were changed to a form, straight taper and a new engine of 875 horsepower was added. Further completed. flight testing was virtually flawless. It was ordered into production in 1941.

This rather small float plane proceeded to serve in all theaters of the aircraft would be a great value for South Pacific. Because of its great rate of climb and maneuverability, it was able to serve as a fighter, dive bomber, and recon plane. Virtually all pilots commented on its superb handling and its ability to absorb combat damage. It continued to serve until the end of the war.

A total of 1,118 were made. Its U.S. Navy code name was 'Pete'.

The Mitsubishi F1M2 had a wingspan of 26 feet, a weight of 5,622 pounds and a speed of 230 mph. The powerplant was a Mitsubishi Mk 2 14-cylinder radial that developed 875 horsepower. For armament it carried 3 7.7 machine guns and 261 pounds of bombs. J

The Hungry Hollow Air Field is a beautiful site located at the top of a hill overlooking some great Wisconsin farm land. The grass runway is huge, and well mowed.


Saturday dinner will be held at Hanson's Hideaway in nearby Haugen, Wisconsin where the food is good and plentiful.
