My wife Sandy started checking in pilots and made sure they all had AMA numbers recorded, and checked for radio frequency -- 72mhz or 2.4mhz to avoid radio interference during flights.

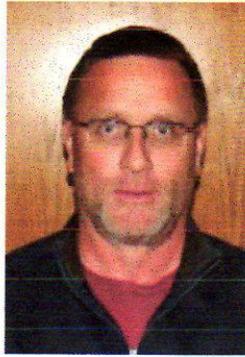
Pilots continued to arrive and at 10:00am I had a pilots' meeting where I discussed rules of flying at Bush Lake. The most important rule is to keep it over the lake so if you go down it can be retrieved easily. I wanted to keep the number of planes in the air at a comfortable number, so recommended a maximum of 5 and to check radio frequencies with others flying. Also be sure to verbalize your intentions (taking off, landing, etc.) and suggested that having a "buddy" watching you was a good idea. An extra set of eyes on a busy day makes end results more positive.

The first pilot in the air was Jeff Tolzmann with his Hobbico 60. It was a short flight due to engine issues but the plane survived and was retrieved by the rescue boat. He was able to fly again after a few adjustments. Throughout the day we had a total of 24 pilots registered flying and over 40 airplanes. We had 3-6 planes in the air at all times until 3 pm. The smallest plane was Glenn Hagfors' UMX Carbon Cub and largest was Sherwood Heggen's Aamoco Sportmaster. Morgan had a rough day when he crashed his Sea Cruiser II and lost his engine in the bottom of the lake. It was nice that his two daughters were there to support him. Terry Spletstoeser brought his Gull Wing Swoose that


Chris has wasted no time becoming part of TCRC as he was one of the judges in the club building contest.

Last month you received one of my late new year's resolutions. I love making late New Year's resolutions because it relieves the pressure of trying to set all my annual goals prior to January 1. Once we get to July or so I will begin making early next year's resolutions. But I digress... That resolution was that I would focus less on making more time for my model aircraft and focus more on making the time I spend on model aircraft as valuable as possible. That seemed like a very easy thing to declare at the time, especially since I was coming off a couple of rather challenging days of flying of which I had clearly made the best. But as I began to think about how I was going to expand on that declaration an important and challenging question began to emerge. What does it mean to make time "better" or "more valuable"? Time is just a concept. It is, per Merriam-Webster, "the indefinite continued progress of existence and events in the past, present, and future regarded as a whole". How am I supposed to increase the value of *that*? After spending a few minutes being generally overwhelmed with the task I assigned myself I calmed down a little bit and began to get my head around explaining what I was trying to get to in last month's article.

My original plan was to talk each month about the ways I was spending my time or the things I was doing that might not fit into the realm of my normal activities within the hobby. The normal activities being assembling, tweaking, and flying. Lather, rinse, repeat if you will. I am not saying my routine is mundane but I am certainly a creature of habit and could certainly benefit from a little variety.

I do have a bucket list of sorts. Building a plane from my youth, building a plane from scratch, and figuring out how to execute that rolling figure eight are all examples of things I would like to accomplish before I leave this life. As I began to think how and the order in which I would begin to tackle these items I began to wonder if I was missing something. Does checking items off my bucket list equate to spending better time with the hobby? I certainly believe it to be a piece of the puzzle but I am thinking it does not capture the meaning of what I was declaring in the original statement. 

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Polikarpov TIS (Samolet MA)

The May Mystery Plane was the Polikarpov TIS (Samolet MA).



To meet the requirement for a heavy escort fighter (TIS) Polikarpov, late in 1938, designed a low-wing monoplane, all-metal, powered by 2-1,400 horsepower Mikulin radial engines. He called for 4-7.62 machine guns and 2-20 mm cannons, rear protection provided by a single 7.62 machine gun, fired from a dorsal and ventral position by a single gunner (Busy!)

The first prototype was flown September, 1941. However the Polikarpov facility was destroyed, and a move delayed progress. A second, now the Samolet MA was not flown until June 1944. The MA was to have 1,700 horsepower engines, but they were not available. Flight testing was underway when Polikarpov died, and his DKB was dismantled, and the TIS program was abandoned.

Only the two prototypes were completed. Based on the design, the Samolet MA would probably have been a great fighter-bomber. However, Russia, was heavily at war with the German Army and Air Force. As it turned out, Germany's worst enemy was the Russian winter!

The Samolet MA had a wingspan of 50 feet 10.5 inches, and was powered by two Mikulin 9-cylinder radial engines, each developing 1,665 horsepower. J

TCRC Awarded Field Improvement Grant From AMA

At the May 9th membership meeting treasurer Tim Wirtz announced that TCRC had been awarded \$2,160 from the AMA as a grant to help defer the cost of the new runways the club had put in this past year.

Club member Dan Olberg had been reading his copy of *Model Aviation* and noticed an article stating that AMA had \$30,000 in funds specially set aside to help member clubs defer the cost of field improvements. Dan gave the TCRC board a call and the club completed an application. If a club were to be selected, AMA would pay up to 10% of the improvement costs that had been spent.




Tim Wirtz and Dan Olberg hold the grant certificate and the check from the AMA at the May meeting. (Photo by Jim Cook)

24 AMA clubs applied for some of the \$30,000 grant money, and TCRC was fortunate enough to be awarded the amount of \$2,160, which is 10% of the field's blacktopping costs.



FAA Drone Registration Overturned

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia struck down the FAA's rule that required owners of drones used for recreation to register their craft.

About 760,000 hobbyists have registered more than 1.6 million drones since 2015. The FAA estimates that hobbyists will buy 2.3 million drones this year and 13 million by the end of 2020.

A spokesman for the FAA said that the agency was reviewing the decision. J

Later, after our performances were complete and I was pulling my model by the tail to my car, a little boy ran up to me and asked me to autograph his program. I proudly signed my name followed by "The Red Baron."


