

Our flying season has started with a bit of a challenge, too much water. When will the water leave the field and when can we fly there again? Thanks to president Bob, TCRC has 2 alternate flying sights in the metro area while our field is not available -- the Scott County Fairgrounds and Stoker Airport, just east of the field. Both are good flying sites, but are limited to the size of the models, meaning giant-scale is out except for maybe Cub-type planes. Ion addition the Owatonna RC club, not SMMAC, has offered flying to TCRC for the month of June I believe. A number of us are members at SMMAC in Owatonna, mainly giant-scale warbirds. No matter where you fly, make sure you follow all AMA and club rules.

Now that you are flying, what is your favorite plane to fly or if you don't have one yet, what is your favorite one to build? Notice I said 'build'. There are so many to choose from: giant-scale, scale, sport, pattern or aerobatic, or even classic pattern. The two that I'm thinking of building in the classic pattern are either a Mach 1 or a Sig Kougar. I have had both of these and both are excellent flying models. You can put retracts on both or just fixed gear. Either way they fly great.

As I'm writing this, I'm looking at a picture of my son Nathan when he was little helping me fuel my Kougar. I had modified it to look like a smaller Mach 1. Maybe that will be the one I build again.

As nice as the foam planes have become, they still don't compare to ones made out of wood. A company called Motion RC has many models to choose from, all made of foam, but now they are importing some that are made of wood. A thing of the future, just think, models made out of balsa wood!

Sherwood also won the non-scale category with this V-Tail that was designed by Bob Swenson. They are shown above with the plane.




The participant award went to Wayne Fischer for a plane he built called Amiee I believe. Wayne and Amiee are shown above.

1928 - 2019

Jim Miller, former member, and officer of TCRC passed away on May 17, 2019. Jim was 91 and was suffering from Alzheimer's for many years.

Talk about building, Jim was one of the best. He not only built many one-of-a-kind planes, but he also drew the plans and built the retracts if the model needed them. Jim flew in many contests, was a CD so he ran the contests as well. In the 1980's we formed a demonstration team sponsored by the AMA called the Blue Eagles. A number of TCRC members were part of the group including Jim, Jim Taylor, Sherwood Heggen, Steve Meyer, Bill Altenhofen, Dave Andersen, Lank Newman, myself (Chris) and a few other guys. Jim, Sherwood, and I would fly formation with our Kougars. Jim also had Snoopy's

flying Doghouse, which he flew well and would perform with Dave Andersen, The Red Baron. Jim loved all kind of models, but in the 1980's he decided that bigger was better.

Jim was one the first guys, a pioneer in the country to build a giant-scale Hellcat that he designed, and built every aspect of the plane. That was the plane that caused a bad accident and cut Jim's left arm to the bone. From then on we all would have someone hold our planes or tie them down to be started. Jim's pride and joy was one of the last models he built, a 10 and a one-half-foot wingspan P-38 Lightning, his favorite plane.

Jim helped many guys learn to fly, including myself. The very first time I brought my plane to the field, a VK Cherokee, Jim offered to help me learn to fly. Not only did he teach me that, but I met his daughter Lynn, my future wife. Jim was the father I never had. Thank you, Jim for everything you did for me, I will never forget.

There will be a memorial service for Jim on June 11, 2019 at the Cremation Society, 7110 France Ave. S, Edina. 3 pm for a visitation, 4 pm for a service, and 5 pm for a light supper.

Flying will start around 10 AM and continue until around 2 PM.


Plan on bringing your electric aircraft and do some enjoyable flying. This event is open to any pilot with a valid AMA 2019 membership card.

Beriev KOR 1

The May Mystery Plane was the Soviet Beriev KOR 1.



Although the Soviet Navy employed a substantial number of flying boats during World War II, very few float planes were used. The only float plane to serve was the KOR 1. The plane was intended for both catapult and land use.

First flown in 1934, it was all-metal, with fabric covering. The single step float was braced with two pairs of parallel struts. Provision was made for a single forward 7.62 machine gun, with a similar gun for the rear observer. Light bombs could be carried under the wings. With production started in 1935, most planes were for catapult service aboard cruisers. Total number built is unknown.

In 1935 a second model was started, the KOR 2. A larger engine, slightly higher speed, and higher bomb load were new features. The two models, even though obsolete, continued to serve all during World War II. Pilots reported no bad habits, except flying in cold weather with open cockpits! A few were fitted with cockpit fairings, however.

Interestingly, note the resemblance to the Polikarpove I-115, and the I-153, both commonly called the Rata (Rat).

The KOR 1 had a wingspan of 36-feet 1-inch and was powered with a 750 horsepower M-25 9-cylinder engine. It had a speed of 149 mph. **J**

Election Nominations Due July 3, 2019

Nominations due for AMA president and vice presidents in Districts I, V, and IX

Nominations for AMA president and vice presidents in Districts I, V, and IX are due at the Headquarters of the Academy of Model Aeronautics July 3, 2019. Any AMA Adult Member may submit a nomination.

To be eligible to discharge the duties of AMA president, a nominee must be a Leader Member of the AMA and must previously have served as a member of the Executive Council or associate vice president or as a Contest Board member for at least one (1) year.

To be eligible to discharge the duties of AMA vice president, a nominee must be a Leader Member of the AMA and must reside in the district.

(Nominees and nominators will be notified by HQ confirming receipt of form, nomination. If confirmation is not received within two weeks after you complhave sent your document, contact Joyce Hager at [765] 287-1256, extension 200.)

A letter of acceptance and a résumé of professional qualifications and model aviation experience from the nominee must be on file at AMA Headquarters by July 18, 2019, 15 days prior to the published meeting.

Dear members,

Earlier today, the FAA issued a notice that provides temporary guidance for recreational fliers. AMA is already working with the FAA to make accommodations for our members, and we wanted to let you know what to expect.

First, we'll share a bit of background. Throughout the past few years, thousands of new recreational drone users and more than 400,000 new commercial drone operators have entered the airspace. Late last year, Congress passed and President Donald Trump signed into law the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018. This law gives the FAA more authority to address the surge of new users and changing airspace. Part of the law includes Section 349, which outlines eight statutory requirements for the recreational operation of all unmanned aircraft, including all drone and been organizing the order of the club model aircraft hobbyists. The FAA is tasked with creating new rules in accordance with this law.

The guidance the FAA issued today is one step in a long process to • create and implement the new rules for recreational fliers. It's important • to note that at this stage in the process, the guidance does not constitute official rules and it's not legally binding.

Here's what you can expect: AMA is working with the FAA to accommodate our diverse, safe, and responsible community with future regulations. Together, we are working to ease the burden of compliance with the guidance issued today and, eventually, with the new rules. We regularly engage the FAA, including multiple meetings yesterday, to discuss the details of these solutions.

As a next step, we will begin working with AMA members and clubs located near airports to establish letters of agreement. These letters of agreement will formalize the special accommodations for our community and allow AMA members to continue flying at these fixed flying sites without interruption.

AMA members have flown safely in our nation's skies for decades, and the FAA recognizes that; however, we are entering a new era of unmanned aviation and with that come changes. We are doing

everything we can to ensure that this transition is smooth, and our hobby is protected.

We will keep you updated on the FAA's process of creating and implementing new rules, as well as our work to find solutions for AMA members. If you have questions, please do not hesitate to reach out.


The apparel is pretty nifty looking.
