TCRC has a great tradition of holding an annual Building Contest in May, and the 2024 edition was held at CrossPoint Church on May 14th.

Over the years the Building Contest has had many forms, ranging from present who all became critical being held at the flying field and the winner having to prove that the plane judges. Their task was not easy to was airworthy, to static contests held at the May membership meeting and having several categories that a builder could enter, to the current static version where there are no categories and everyone present is a judge to determine the one entrant that all the judges deemed to be the favorite. Chris O'Connor has been the CD for the Building Contest for several years and was the one who settled on the current format for the event.

There were seven entries in the BC this year, which Chris was happy to say was a good increase over the previous year. All aircraft were wellbuilt and deserving entries in the contest. There were 21 members present who all became critical judges. Their task was not easy to pick only one aircraft as winner from the seven entries.

However, when the dust had settled, Brian Johnson's Ace 4-60 emerged as the winner of the building contest.

This past winter, Brian held a 'building night' once a week at his house and several TCRC'ers took part. Brian constructed his 4-60 from an original 1980's Ace kit. He had modified the kit, eliminating the turtle deck and fortifying the craft with carbon fiber in several places. It was done in white 'kote' with blue trim and powered with an OS 70 Surpass 4-stroke engine. It is not believed that the nice-looking bird has had its maiden flight as yet.

Congratulations to Brian, and thanks to the other entrants for making the BC a competitive event. Special thanks to Chris O'Connor for CD'ing a great contest!

Minnesota River Report

With the continued rainfall, which is badly needed in Minnesota, the Minnesota River has continued to rise and remain above the 18-foot mark at Jordan, where the TCRC Flying Site becomes inundated with flood water.


On June 2nd the River was 23.2 feet. Projections are that it will rise to a crest of 26.3 feet on June 7th, and probably remain around that level for a period of time. The National Water Prediction Service (NWPS) has not yet predicted the River level past June 9th. However, looking at the previous week's levels and the next week's predicted levels, it is prudent to assume that the water may be above the 18-foot mark for a couple of weeks past June 7th.

If we do not get heavy rainfall west in the Minnesota River basin, it is possible that the field may be clear of water near the end of June. However, the field does need time to dry out before the club can schedule a cleanup date. The officers will keep the membership informed as to when we can reclaim the field.

As an added note, the National Water Prediction Service (NWPS) is replacing the Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service (AHPS). The NOAA website that charts the Minnesota River level at Jordan and makes the predictions is changing. Right now, when a person goes to the old site, that site automatically goes to the new prediction site.

CD for the event, Steve Meyer, felt safety always comes first. Minnesota has had more than its share of strong winds this spring.

TCRC had spent considerable time making this an AMA-sanctioned event and obtaining temporary FRIA (FAA Recognized Identification Area) so that AMA pilots flying at the event would NOT be required to have remote ID broadcasting modules on their aircraft.

A couple of nice planes showed up for Show & Tell at the May membership meeting. Actually, both planes were entrants in the TCRC Building Contest but were also shared in S&T after the contest.



Ken Weddell had a great looking 4-60 which he built from an Ace kit. Actually, TCRC'er Brian Johnson had hosted a weekly building session at his house and Ken built the 4-60 at those sessions. Brian also built an Ace 4-60 at the same sessions, and he actually won the Building Contest with it. So, Ken's 4-60 is a sister to the 2024 BC winner. Ken's finished aircraft weighed in at 8-pounds 6-ounces and was done in white 'kote' with red trim lines. Ken said he built his plane according to the plans with no modifications. He powered the aircraft with an OS 70 Surpass 4stroke. The wingspan was around 60-inches. As of the May meeting, Ken's 4-60 has yet to have its maiden flight but should take to the air as soon as the Jordan field is free of the Minnesota River.

Prolific Larry Couture had another new airplane at the meeting. (See photo to the upper right.) Larry said he had seen this plane in his mind and decided to build it from scratch. He had actually seen a photo of the plane. It is the Bat-Plane from the Batman comic books and movies, and Larry had decided he needed to construct one. He said he really didn't quite like the lines of the Batman plane he had seen, and so made design modifications. He scratch-built the aircraft from his mental plans.



It was covered in black Monokote with the yellow bat insignia. It came in with an 86-inch wingspan and a weight of 9-pounds. He powered it with a Saito 180 4-stroke engine. Larry said this is the 16th time he has constructed a plane from scratch. As of the meeting the Bat Plane has not had its maiden flight and it must wait until TCRC reclaims the Jordan field from the Minnesota River.



Belyayev Babochka (Butterfly)

The May Mystery Plane was the Russian Belyayev Babochka.



The concept of this airplane was to test the center of lift versus the center of gravity, an unknown theory in the 1930s. This experiment resulted in a one off plane. This seemed a rather useless plan, since thousands of wings and planes had already flown, with no problems.

The plane, with its peculiar wing, was ready for flight testing. The plane was a low-wing monoplane, of usual construction. It had a rather large piston engine and was of all-metal. The object was to make a wing flexible, and flex upwards, and one section to flex down, and still remain stable (Why?). Fuselage had a tandem cockpit, and for some reason had a rather small stabilizer and elevator, for a plane this size.

The aircraft, built at the outbreak of WWII, had very little flight testing, and there was no reason to think it would have been any more useful than some Russian fighters already in production and proven in combat. The idea of upper and lower flexible wing panels disappeared, and, of course, no production resulted.

The Babochka was a two-seat fighter-bomber with a wingspan of 35feet six-inches, a weight of 2,266-pounds, and a speed of 317 mph. It was powered with a Rernault M-V 6-cylinder air-cooled engine that developed 270 horsepower.


