Interim Final Rule Released For FAA-issued Registration

AMA Government Affairs is writing to let you know the FAA issued an <u>Interim Final Rule</u> today (February 20, 2019) that will require drone pilots and model aircraft pilots to display their FAA-issued registration number on the outside surface of their aircraft. The rule will take effect on Monday, February 25, which means the markings must be in place for any outdoor flight beginning on that date.

Although most AMA members already have their FAA registration number posted on the outside of their aircraft, AMA will be submitting comments to the FAA requesting a waiver process for those who might be burdened by external markings, such as members who fly scale replica model aircraft. Most importantly, this rule does not change the original acceptable methods of external marking, nor does it specify a particular external surface on which the registration number must be placed. The requirement is simply that the registration number must be seen upon visual inspection of the aircraft's exterior.

As you know, the registration requirement is not new. Congress reinstated this requirement in December 2017 with the <u>passage</u> of the National Defense Authorization Act. Although this rule was flexible and allowed the registration marking to be placed in an enclosed compartment, law enforcement officials and FAA partners have expressed concerns about the safety risks a concealed explosive device could pose to first responders when opening a compartment to find a registration number.

If you would like to submit your own comment on the Interim Final Rule, simply visit<u>www.regulations.gov</u> and search for "RIN 2120-AL32." You can also visit<u>www.faa.gov/news/updates/?newsId=93045</u> to learn more. The deadline for public comment ends on March 15, 2019.

If you are uncertain if you have a valid FAA registration, you can access your FAA account at<u>https://faadronezone.faa.gov/#</u>. This site will allow you to view your personal FAA registration number and expiration date. We strongly advise you to avoid registering your model aircraft anywhere other than the official FAA website. If you register under

Section 336, there is a \$5 fee for a three-year registration, and hobbyists receive one identification number for all of their aircraft. Please be aware of unofficial registration websites that charge exorbitant fees or require separate registration fees for each recreational aircraft.

We continue to work closely with the FAA to determine the best path forward regarding recreational UAS operating requirements. As always, thank you for your continued support, and please reach out with any questions.



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Well with all this bad weather we are having, it gives us a perfect time for building. That is if we take advantage of if. To be honest, I have not done the best this winter in that category, but I do have my fleet just about ready for spring.

I know the newest ruling from the FAA is that we have to now have our FAA number on an external surface of the airplane. When I first read that, I thought no way am I going to put that on my T-34 that I spent 3 years building, it would ruin all the scale detail I tried so hard to duplicate. After I calmed down and thought about it rationally and also read what others might do, I started thinking of creative ways to put that registration on my models. It said the FAA registration had to be on an external surface of the plane only. Nothing about where or size. So, I emailed Callie at Callie Graphics and asked her if she could print me some numbers, black on clear Mylar. I wanted the numbers to be 1/32 of an inch high. She said she could do that, so just in case it was blurred, I had her do numbers in 1/32 and also 1/16 inch high. I just received them today and they are fantastic. Callie made what she called was two sheets of numbers, both Nathan's and mine and in both sizes. Each sheet contains 32 of both sizes of each number. So, we have 64 numbers and she charged me \$10.00. Unbelievable! Callie is great to work with and very prompt. Thank you, Callie! I will bring a sheet to the meeting so everyone can see the numbers. The 1/32 size are just a little over $\frac{1}{4}$ inch long and the 1/16 are just about 9/16-inch length. I'm going to put the numbers either on the backside of a hinge line, aileron or flap or on the end of an aileron or flap, all on the external surface of the model. Also, to clarify our flying machines have wings and stabilizers and a fin and a fuselage so they are airplanes -- model airplanes, not drones. Ok enough ranting.

Remember our March meeting is pizza night. A big thank you for your help at the auction. We will also have a program featuring Piper Cubs. "Cub night", don't miss it.

March 12th Is Cub Night

Lockheed XP-49

Within a few months of the successful flight of the XP-38, Lockheed began work on a successor to the original P-38. It was to have Pratt and Whitney's new engine – the X-1800 24-cylinder power plant, giving the plane an estimated speed of 473 mph. This plane was larger in most dimensions and featured a pressurized cabin.

Almost immediately, a new engine was recommended – a Continental X-1430. Now, speed was estimated at 458 mph.

This plane was first flown on November 11, 1942. Three flight tests flown and another engine change, plus fuel tank changes. More flight testing was done in January, 1943. The plane crashed due to hydraulic and total electrical failure. As it turns out, the flaps were also reversed! It was not flown again until late February, 1943, and speed was then not there. The plane was ferried to Wright-Patterson, where a 2-man cockpit was installed. Flight testing was resumed in May, 1944. The port engine failed, at which time, further work was abandoned. Only one plane was built.

The XP-49 had a wingspan of 52-feet, and a speed of only 406 mph. Its final engines were two Continental X-1430's with 12-cylinders, liquid-cooled and developing 1,600 horsepower. Its armament consisted of 2-20mm cannon and 4-50-caliber machine guns.

It also has 15 metric wrenches in these sizes: 0.7mm, 0.9mm, 1.3mm, 1.5mm, 2.0mm, 2.5mm, 3.0mm, 4.0mm, 4.5mm, 5.0mm, 5.5mm, 6.0mm, 7.0mm, 8.0mm and 10.0 mm.

The set comes in a very nice folding case which holds and labels each Allen wrench. The case can also be mounted on your shop wall if you so desire to do that.

President Bob Breisemeister has some very nice airplanes for sale.


Bob's planes range from small electric ARF's up to 1/3-scale sport planes. Some planes are still in kit form, and some are entirely completed.
