Minnesota River Claims TCRC Jordan Flying Site

With the spring thaw of all of the snow that we experienced in Minnesota this past winter, the water level in the Minnesota River at Jordan has continued to climb.

The TCRC Flying Field in Jordan was inundated with river flooding for the month of April, with the river cresting at Jordan at 28 feet on April 24th. The Jordan field will start to flood above 18 feet.

Since the crest, the water is slowly receding at a constant rate. On May 1st it was at 25 feet and is projected to be at 22 feet by May 8th. If that rate continues, the Minnesota River at Jordan should be around 18 feet on

May 15th or so, barring any heavy rain to the west. So, there is a very reasonable possibility we will be back on our field before June 1.

In the meantime, we have our alternate flying site at the Scott County Fairgrounds, and the Owatonna R/C Modelers Club has graciously offered the use of their flying site while our field is indisposed.

TCRC will be scheduling a field clean-up as soon as the field again becomes available.

TCRC Building Contest May 9th

At the membership meeting scheduled for 7:00 PM May 9th at CrossPoint Church, TCRC will hold its annual Building Contest.

This is your chance to bring that new winter project, or that plane that you picked up at the auction and totally refurbished and enter it into the 2023 contest.

There are no categories or classes in this year's event. All of the members in attendance are the judges, and that airplane that they select will be the winner of the contest. That pilot receives a gift certificate and bragging honors for the year.

The Spring Swap Meet will be held on the 20th at the Scott County Fairgrounds due to our field conditions. It will start at 8am and go until noon or so. Please invite your friends from other clubs to come as venders or buyers as we are trying to grow this event. There is not a table fee and weather permitting the runway will be open.

Starting in June the membership meetings will be held at the TCRC flying field at 7pm with food provided by TCRC at 5:30, donations of desserts or money accepted. Come out early and make a day of flying or come for dinner and the meeting.

Owatonna R/C Modelers Club Extends Welcome To TCRC

Owatonna R/C Modelers Club has offered free use of their field to all TCRC members while our field is flooded. This is NOT the SMAAC field where the Watts Over Owatonna, Jet Fly and other contests are held. The letter extending the offer is below:

Hi Gents

Dick Baumer here! I'm Treasurer and past president of the Owatonna RC Modelers club in Owatonna. I was at our field flying today and in conversation with another member learned that TCRC is underwater obviously due to river flooding. Some years ago our club extended an offer to any TCRC member that was looking for an alternate field to enjoy our facility. The offer at that time was no fee for a six week period which would allow your field to dry out and complete required cleanup. As I remember 10 or so folks accepted the offer. After discussing the issue today with other officers it was decided to extend that offer again. All we ask is that any member that wishes to use our field provide us with contact information, AMA and FAA ID. I will provide each member on the list a temporary card that contains the code to the combination locks on buildings and the gate and serves as an ID. During the six week period members may come and go at will

and use all facilities. All we ask is that common sense prevail and that trash be taken with you or disposed of in the proper container and that the gate and buildings be locked if you are the last to leave. The six week period would run from May 6 through June 15th but could possibly be extended if the flooding situation is not resolved. That's actually a little more than six weeks. Again, there would be no fee for this short period and we hope takers fly often and fly safely.

Those that have not visited our facility will enjoy the wide open area. Our main 360 foot fabric north-south runway is ideal for 90% of flying. The slightly shorter crosswind runway works for the other 10%. We also have lots of short cut grass area for those that prefer landing and takeoff on the green stuff. At this time there are no crops and there are never any trees to be concerned about. Be aware this is not the SMMAC field. Our address is 4546 43rd Ave SW. An aerial view of our field is shown on our website: Owatonna-RC-Modelers.com.

If anyone would like the visit, our next club meeting is 6:30 pm Wednesday, May 3 at the field. Meetings are generally short and folks come early to do some flying before the meeting and after if weather permits. My contact information is provided below if anyone is interested. For reference, Owatonna is 38 freeway miles from County Rd 70 (Mc Stop) in Lakeville.



Larry Couture had a Bleriot XI that he scratch-built from photos. It had a 78-inch wingspan and weighed in at 7-3/4 pounds. The wing was done in red Monokote and the fuse was open-framework. He powered the plane with a Saito 90 Twin 4-stroke engine. The wing included flaps. As of the meeting, the Bleriot had not had its maiden flight.



New member Brent Schulz had a Carl Goldberg Eagle 2 plane at the meeting. Brent started this plane 25 years ago. The Eagle 2 had a 62-inch wingspan and was done in yellow Monokote. Brent had a Supertigre

45 ABC 2-stroke engine in it for power. He plans the maiden flight for this spring.



Ken Weddell had a Hanger 9 Super Stick ARF at the meeting. Ken had purchased this plane at our annual auction. It had a 53-inch wingspan and weighed in at 5 pounds. For power it had a 55 OS AX two-stroke engine. The maiden flight is scheduled for this spring.



Sherwood Heggen had an Aeromaster that he picked up at the TCRC auction. The airplane had been built from AAMCO plans. The plane had a white fuse and red/white wings. The wingspan was 52-inches and it weighed 6-3/4 pounds. It was powered by a Saito 91 4-stroke engine. He said the plane had some construction problems that he had to correct, so had done a lot of disassembly and rebuilding to make it a straight and flyable model. He also added wing struts to give the plane a nicer look. He has not done a maiden flight on this Aeromaster yet but said he has had two previous ones that were excellent models.



The Kaos was a very popular pattern ship in the 70's, designed by Joe Bridi. Scott's plane had an electric motor and a 6-cell lipo for power supply. As of the meeting, Scott had not put the maiden flight on the Kaos.

May Mystery Plane







Blackburn B-20

The April Mystery Plane was the Blackburn B-20 Flying Boat.



One of the most interesting flying boats built during the war years was the Blackburn B-20. The idea was to reconcile the problem of angle of incidence and streamlining a float plane for takeoff and level flight. Designers thought that a retractable pontoon was the answer.

The primary hull was all-aluminum, and the 'pontoon' was similar to a regular type, 48 feet long and actuated hydraulically. When the float was extended, the hull then was at the best take off attitude, and when retracted the plane was completely streamlined.

The plane had bow and tail turrets. It was test flown in the early 40's and performed well on the water and in the air. This plane was the only unit produced and was lost in a crash early in test flights, and no further research was done.

The Blackburn B-20 was a medium-range recon flying boat. It had a wingspan of 82 feet 2 inches, a speed of 306 mph and a range of 1,500 miles. It was powered by two HP 24-cylinder X-type liquid-cooled engines that each developed 1,830 horsepower. For armament it had six 303 caliber machine guns and carried eight 250 pound bombs.

AMA District VII Vice President Election

(Reprinted From Model Aviation, Vol. 49, No. 4, April 2023)

(AMA District VII encompasses the states of Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin)

Nominations for AMA executive vice president and vice presidents in Districts III, VII, and XI are due at the Headquarters of the Academy of Model Aeronautics by June 29, 2023. Any AMA Adult member may submit a nomination.

To be eligible to discharge the duties of AMA executive vice president, a nominee must be a Leader Member of the AMA and must previously have served as a member of the Executive Council or associate vice president or as a Contest Board member for at least one (1) year.

To be eligible to discharge the duties of AMA vice president, a nominee must be a Leader Member of the AMA and must reside in the district.

(Nominees and nominators will be notified by HQ confirming receipt of nomination. If confirmation is not received within two weeks after you have sent your document, contact Joyce Hager at [765] 287-1256, extension 200.)

A letter of acceptance and a résumé of professional qualifications and model aviation experience from the nominee must be on file at AMA Headquarters by July 14, 2023, 15 days prior to the published meeting.

Nominating Procedure Document

Relating to Article IX

Candidate Guidelines:

- 1. No person may nominate himself/herself for office.
- 2. No shall person simultaneously hold two positions on the Executive Council. In the event a person holding an office is elected or selected to a second position on the Executive Council, that person must choose which of the two positions he/she will continue, such decision to be made within 48 hours of the announcement of the selection, or else the person so affected will be deemed to have selected to remain in the first office held.
- 3. Incumbent is automatically placed on the ballot, provided that he/she has been properly nominated and accepted, except that a 3/4 vote against may withhold the incumbent's name from the ballot (see Bylaws, Article IX, Section 2).
- 4. All nominations must be received at AMA Headquarters thirty (30) days prior to the convening of the Nominating Committee Meeting. A11 be information must submitted by electronic means.

- 5. Candidate must be a legal resident of the district in which the election is being held; this does not apply to the office of the President or Executive Vice President.
- 6. Candidate must be a current AMA member with Leader Member status (other qualifications apply to the office of the President and Executive Vice President, Article IX, section 3).

7. No person elected to and

serving as an active member of the Executive Council shall be paid for any regular column or article in Model Aviation magazine. Exception may be made for such articles as the coverage of special events provided arrangement prior made for said article. Articles and columns printed in the "AMA News" section are not paid contributions. No paid columns may be submitted

after the individual has been

Candidate Acceptance:

All correspondence must be submitted electronically to AMA HQ Muncie IN. Failure to meet all requirements, will disqualify said nominee.

placed on the ballot.

(A) A letter of acceptance by the candidate and his or her résumé must be electronically submitted 15 days prior to the meeting. Included should be professional qualifications and model aviation experience, along with the items listed below.

- 1. Management experience.
- 2. Financial background.
- 3. Insurance employment and/or expertise.
- 4. Legal background.
- 5. Technical background, including areas of aeronautics, electronics (especially in radio frequency propagation and usage), acoustics (as related noise studies analysis), and other areas of engineering.
- 6. Aeromodeling background must be noted. The individual will be required, if elected to national office, to deal with questions related to all areas of aeromodeling and should have a broad-based background.
- **(B)** Campaign statements must be received at AMA Headquarters 10 days prior to the Nominating Committee meeting. Campaign statements will not be read by any person until it is determined who will be placed on the ballot.
- (C) Each candidate is allowed one AMA-financed campaign email push, which will occur simultaneously for each race. It will consist of a maximum of 750 words (a URL will be considered one word) and one current head shot photo if desired. The content of the email push is due to the AMA HQ 10 days after the nominating committee has determined the

ballot. The content of the email must be sent electronically so that it can be cut and pasted by staff to eliminate error. The email will be sent 20 days after the nominating committee has set the ballot.

(Editor's Note: For the last several years, the District VII Vice President has been from the state of Michigan. This is a good time to consider nominating someone from Minnesota for that position.)
