Just to let you know April is gone and May is upon us. Unfortunately, the spring rains are here and the river level has gone up enough to flood the main field. Not so lucky this time as the field is flooded and going to 23 feet. The main field is closed and the Scott County Fairgrounds is open for flying.

Depending on when the water is gone and how fast the field dries out the Swap Meet on May 19th most likely will be moved to the Fairgrounds. When the location is decided I will let you know and post it on the website.

On a positive note, the rain should have improved the water level at Bush Lake for the Float Fly on the 18th of May. TCRC was granted a temporary FRIA site for the Float Fly so you will not need your remote ID in your planes.

The Beauty Contest I mean Building Contest will be held at the May Membership Meeting on the 14th at Crosspoint Church. Bring the airplane you built or even just assembled to be judged by TCRC members. There is a gift certificate for the winner.

Starting in June and going through September the Membership Meetings will move to the TCRC Flying field with dinner at 5:30 and the meeting at 7pm. Food and beverages are provided but a donation is welcome to help cover the cost. Come early or stay late and do some flying or come and meet fellow club members.

There are new membership IDs being made that will have a clip to enable you to wear them at the field or membership meeting. It is not required to wear the name tag but you could put it on your hat, belt or field box. TCRC Spring Float Fly May 18th

Time to get your feet wet. TCRC's annual Spring Float Fly will again be held at Bush Lake Park in Bloomington on Saturday, May 18th.

This event is open to any pilot with a valid 2024 AMA membership card.

As of March 16, the FAA requirement that all R/C aircraft in the air must be registered with the FAA and have a remote ID module broadcasting onboard, unless they are flying at a FRIA (FAA-Recognized Identification Area). TCRC has applied for temporary FRIA status for the Spring Float Fly and anticipates that all requirements for that status will be met prior to the event.

Start time for the Spring Float Fly on May 18th is 10:00 AM or as soon as we get the retrieval boat in the water. The CD for the event is Steve Meyer.

If it's too windy or raining, we will cancel the event.

Get the floats out and onto a plane or two and be at Bush Lake beach on May 18^{th} .

Minnesota River Report

How things can change in just a week. With the almost snowless winter Minnesota experienced this year, it appeared that there would be absolutely no flooding of the TCRC Jordan Flying site in the spring of 2024. Most of the winter, the Minnesota River at Jordan was at a level of 5 to 8 feet. The Jordan flying site starts to flood when the River is at 18 feet in Jordan.

Suddenly we got a week of steady rain that affected the Minnesota River to the west of Jordan, and on May 1st the River reached 18 feet at Jordan. On May 3rd it climbed to 20.3 feet and is now projected to crest at 23.9 feet on May 7th.

Right now, the National Weather Service is predicting that after crest, the Minnesota River will drop fairly quickly and be back to 18 feet on May 12th. That of course does not allow for any heavy rainstorms that would affect the River to the west.

Optimistically, if the River does vacate the field on May 12th, the amount of silt on the runways could be very low. However, the field does need time to dry out before the club can schedule a clean-up date. The officers will keep the membership informed as to when we can reclaim the field.

Jordan Field Clean-Up Postponed

Field Clean-Up at the TCRC Jordan Flying Site has been temporarily postponed because of the rising Minnesota River inundating the field.

It is hoped that the flooding over the field will be short-lived and that the Field Clean-Up can rescheduled quickly.

It is important that we are able to get back on the field quickly as the club is planning lots of projects to get done that day. Those projects include:

- Shingle The Shelter Roof
- Add Rafter Supports
- Add A Shelf To The Container
- Replace The Spectator Fence
- Service Our Equipment
- General Clean-Up

Once we are back on the field, start time will probably be 9:00 AM. With all of the projects scheduled we will need a good turnout of manpower. Bring your tools and some extra energy, and maybe a plane or two. With all of the work to be done we are not sure there will be time to fly afterward, but it is always good to be prepared.

At the May 14th TCRC membership meeting we should have a better idea of the duration of the flooding and when we can schedule the Field Clean-Up.

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Four aircraft showed up for Show & Tell at the April 9th membership meeting.



Joe Neidermayr had a great looking Tucan made from a Multiplex kit. The plane was constructed of foam and had a 51-inch wingspan and weighed in at 4-1/2 pounds. Joe said the kit is from Germany and is no longer made. It was done in white with red/orange trim and powered with a Turnigy 3548 electric motor. Joe said it flies very well.




Sherwood Heggen had a beautiful Great Planes RV4 at the meeting. The plane had a 52-inch wingspan and weighed in at 7-pounds. It was covered in UltraKote and done in white with red and black trim. Sherwood purchased the RV4 at the 2023 TCRC Swap Meet. At that time it had a 40-size engine. Sherwood swapped out that engine with a Super Tigre 51. Prior to the Heggen restoration done to the plane, he had flown it and said it flew well. Since the restoration it has yet to fly but he expects it will do very well.



Jim Ronhovde brought two witches to the meeting. The first was Broom Hilda, his 45-year old witch that has started showing her age and her need for retirement. She had spent many years flying over the TCRC field and was always a favorite of the young spectators who were fortunate to see her flying on her broom. Broom Hilda was powered with a glow engine. When she was built electric flight was not an option, but 45 years later, electric aircraft are everywhere. Many people told Jim an electric conversion should occur. Instead, Jim scratch-built her replacement – E-Lida. Sporting a 30inch cape-span and tipping the scales at 2-pounds, E-Lida is ready to bring smiles to the faces of the next generation.

Curtiss SOC-1 Seagull

The April Mystery Plane was the Curtiss SOC-1 Seagull.



Intended to replace the Vought Corsair, the plane was ordered on June 1, 1933. The plane's considerably modernized features included folding wings, and an amphibious landing gear, retracting into a single float. The fuselage was of welded chrome steel, like the wings was fabric-covered.

The central float housed an auxiliary fuel tank. The plane's sea trials were completed successfully in 1935. The new plane was sent to the U.S. Marblehead in 1935. The catapult plane was then sent to Memphis, Indianapolis, and several other battleships.

The catapult plane, of which 83 were built, served until 1944, in campaigns in such well-known as Guadalcanal, Wake Island, the Gilbert and Marshall Islands. During its service, the Seagull was constantly upgraded, with several different engines.

The Seagull had a wingspan of 36-feet, a combat-ready weight of 5,437-pounds, and a speed of 133 mph. For power plane it had a 600 horsepower Pratt and Whitney R 1340 9-cylinder radial engine.


His column appeared on page 105 of the May 2024 issue of *Model Aviation*, which just came out this week, and it was great PR for TCRC and the Annual Auction.

More Than Just R/C Airplanes In The Air In Arizona


