

Scale Program At TCRC Meeting Has Great Airplanes

Vice president Chris O'Connor presented a program on scale airplanes at the October 9th TCRC membership meeting, and it attracted a lot of club members interested in scale, and also a lot of great looking scale aircraft.

Chris had set up the program by asking members to bring some of their scale airplanes and then discuss how they were constructed, flight characteristics, cost, etc. This proved to be a neat format as seven members showed up with a dozen planes, ranging in size from ¹/₄-scale down to mini-size, and from ARF's to kits to scratch-built aircraft.

Chris had brought it his magnificent ¹/₄-scale Beechcraft T-34 and also an ARF P-47 from E-Flite. He said it was his opinion that Top Flite manufactured some of the best warbird kits and ARFs, and he felt that the P-47 was the ultimate flying warbird.

Bob Breisemeister had his P-51 Mustang which he said was a Hanger 9 kit. He said the weight was 15 pounds and the wingspan 65-inches. He said that this particular P-51 needed rudder input during flight.

Sherwood Heggen had a fantastic Bearcat that he had scratch-built. He said this plane was a great flyer and easy to handle.

Joe Neidermayr had an Albatross from E-Flite that was very sharp looking.

Scott Anderson had a bunch of scale planes – a P-37 Aircobra which was an ARF from FMS; an L-4 (military Cub); a tiny Corsair; a Parkzone F4F Wildcat; and a fantastic 1/5th-scale Lysander from Seagull Models.







John Halvorson

John Halvorson, former TCRC and MVRC member died on Thursday, October 12th in Shakopee where he had lived for the last 25 years. John was born in Grafton North Dakota, on July 9, 1939. John and his family moved to Bloomington Minnesota. where he grew up and lived most of his younger life. John graduated from Bloomington High school in 1957. John enlisted in the USAF in 1959, where he served for 5 years as a Technician, Radar and was stationed in Sault Ste. Marie. Michigan for most of those 5 years.

After his Air Force career. John worked as a electronics\computer tech for a number of companies, and also tried the life of a big rig truck driver. In the 1980's, He got interested in RC Airplanes, and flew with the loosely organized club called the Kawasaki Kamikaze's in Shakopee. Eventually this club became MVRC, and John was a charter member and original board MVRC remained in member. operation until 2013 when the land was sold and developed, and a year or two later John joined TCRC, as many of the former MVRC members did.

During the time of John's MVRC membership, he trained many new members, including myself way back in 1983. He was always patient, and helpful, and using the old technique of handing off the transmitter, no buddy boxes back in the early days, it definitely took a lot of patience. He also

During John's RC days, he was involved in many facets of the hobby. He was a great builder, one of the best, and could fly anything. He was involved in Scale, Sport, Quickie 500 racing, and enjoyed the MVRC style Fun Flys, of which he won many.

Bob's planes range from small electric ARF's up to 1/3-scale sport planes. Some planes are still in kit form, and some are entirely completed.


The prices of the various planes are very moderate and any one of the aircraft would be a great value for the money.

This could be yours!



Mitsubishi F1M2

The October Mystery Plane was the Japanese Mitsubishi F1M2.



In 1934, Japan, probably anticipating its attach on the USA, ordered a ship-launched observation biplane. The design program was assigned to Joji Hattory. He produced a very neat plane. It featured an all-metal oval fuselage, an all metal wings. To keep it aerodynamic, he restricted the interplane struts and limited the rat's nest of flying wires. It was engine with an 820-horsepower radial.

The initial plane had rather severe stability problems, which included marked snaking, and it tended to auto rotate. Joji redesigned it, gave it three degrees more dihedral, enlarged the vertical stab 85%, the rudder 30% more and lengthened the main float. The wings were changed to a straight taper and a new engine of 875 horsepower added. Further flight testing was virtually flawless. It was ordered into production in 1941.

This rather small float plane proceeded to serve in all theaters of the great honor. Bring what you have South Pacific. Because of its great rate of climb and maneuverability, it was able to serve as a fighter, dive bomber, and recon plane. Virtually all pilot reports commented on its superb handling and its ability to absorb combat damage. It continued to serve until the end of the war.

A total of 1,118 were built. Its U.S. Navy code name was 'Pete'.

The F1M2 had a wingspan of 26 feet, a weight of 5,622 pounds and a speed of 230 mph. For armament it carried 3 7.7 machine guns and 261 pounds of bombs. J



2019 AMA Dues Statements

Most older TCRC members should have received their 2018 dues statements in the mail in September from the Academy of Model Aeronautics. Newer members renew on the anniversary of the month they ioined.

AMA 2019 dues are the same as the previous year. They are:

- Adult (19-65) \$75
- Senior (65 and up) \$65
- Under 19 Free or \$15 with *MA*

Your AMA membership gives you \$2.5 million in personal liability coverage. \$25,000 in medical coverage and also a subscription to *Model Aviation* for the year.

To belong to TCRC, you must have a valid membership for the year in AMA.

Please note that AMA also has a Park Pilot membership that has a cost of \$38 per year, but that membership is not valid for membership in TCRC.

To renew your membership in AMA, the Academy gives you four methods: at the AMA website, www.modelaircraft.org; by fax at (765) 741-0057; by phone at (800) 435-9262; or by returning the renewal form you received in the mail in the supplied envelope.

Deadline for paying your 2018 AMA dues is December 15 to avoid a lapse in membership services. J
