TCRC's Model Aviation Day Showcases R/C Hobby

Model Aviation Day (MAD) was greeted by warm weather and a nice breeze on Saturday, August 24th. The TCRC field looked great thanks to people who helped the author out the day before and the previous days mowing what could be mowed trimming around the fences and putting up new fencing around a temporary seating area on the east side of the Pit area for spectators. Bob Briesemeister came out early in the morning and swept all the goose poop off the runways and made them look spectacular, and there were a lot of comments about how nice it was to fly off a clean pavement. Brian Johnson and others helped Tim set up for the event that morning and their health was greatly appreciated.

The ground was still soft and was too spongy for spectators to sit in the normal spots without sinking or perhaps slipping, so the decision was made to put a plastic barrier fence in front of the pits area on the right side, the east side of the walkway, and have spectators sit there. We also put the tent where we kept the flight simulator in that area as well and had the roped-off area for airplanes in the grass section right behind the pits. This worked out really well and gave the spectators more access to the planes and the pilots than they've had in the past.



Happy Labor Day weekend to everyone. I wanted to thank everyone that spent time at the field cleaning up the mess, so the rest of us could fly.


I've been out of town on and off this month flying at other fields, and on Lake Vermilion at the end of the month with a float plane and our wood boat, so I haven't been to our flying field yet. The first part of the month we were down in Owatonna for the warbird and classic fly-in. Didn't do much flying there, but we're able to test fly our giant Hanger 9 Beaver on wheels. The model originally belonged to Jim Lundquist who flew it off floats and it was powered by an electric motor. Jim took the electric motor out and installed a DLE 35cc gas engine with onboard start, very cool. The plane flies great and it is relaxing to fly also. We did take it to Fond du Lac and flew it there also. Thanks, Jim, for doing a nice job on the Beaver -- awesome model!


As I mentioned earlier, down in Owatonna the second weekend of August, was the warbird and classic event called NAMFI -- Northern Alliance Military Fly In. I saw a few TCRC members there watching, and of course the seven TCRC guys that ran the flightline all three days. Thanks to Bob B, Steve M, Brian J, Ken W, Sherwood H, Mark H, and Chris O. Everything went smoothly all weekend thanks to that crew. We had 84 pilots registered but maybe only half of them flew. Many of the jets flew all three days. Saturday was the best day with the winds very manageable. One of the highlights was on Saturday Tim Johnson flew his big B-17, 12-15 foot wingspan with Chris Mayer flying cover with a P-51. A big surprise was a pyrotechnics blast on a simulated bomb drop. A great three days of fun, but a little tired at the end.

Three days later four of us (Steve M, Mark W, and Nate and Chris O drove to Fond du Lac for another fly-in, but this time we were flying and not working. There were probably around 100 pilots there. Mark flew his Cub, Steve flew his P-47 and Triplane, Nate flew his P-47 and Beaver, and I flew my T-34. All these planes are giant-scale. We were there from Tuesday thru Saturday. Many of the guys at Owatonna were also at Fond du Lac flying. Two great weeks of giant-scale warbirds and classics.

I also want to inform everyone that Dave Andersen has some books available on Amazon Kindle, and paperbacks. They are *At The Field* -- *Offbeat Stories about R/C Model Airplanes and the People Who Fly Them*, and *The Cello Maker and Other Stories Of Creative People*.

Martin-Baker MB-5

The August Mystery Plane was the British Martin-Baker MB-5.



The MB-5 was considered by many aviation experts to represent the extreme limit of piston-engine fighters. When first flown in May 1944, the plane was in many ways superior to current fighters, both Allied and Axis airplanes.

The Martin-Baker MB-5's handling was superlative. Its cockpit layout was so good that it was considered to be a standard for all piston-engined fighters.

The wings were exceptionally strong yet were simple to produce. The fuselage was of steel tubing and was covered with detachable steel panels. The Griffon engine drove a 6-blade propeller, contra-rotating.

All pilots were unanimous in praise for its handling. One of the mysteries of WWII was why this plane was never put into production! A great number of P-51 pilots said that in many ways the MB-5 was far better.

The MB-5 had a 35-foot wingspan, and a speed of 460 mph at 20,000-feet. It was powered with a Rolls Royce 12-cylinder liquid-cooled engine that developed 2,340 horsepower.


