Wings over Jordan will be held on July 13^{th,} and this will also be at the Scott County Fairgrounds. This event is open to all current AMA members. Electric, nitro and gas-powered planes allowed. The Fun Fly is scheduled to start at 10am and go until 3pm. The TCRC Café will be open with donations accepted. Please call me or Tim Wirtz with questions.

Minnesota River Report

Wow!!! We went into the spring full of optimism that with a winter that was almost devoid of snow and there existed no snowpack to melt and run into the Minnesota River, our Jordan Flying Field would be high and dry and ready for lots of airplanes all spring and summer.

But late April got heavy rain and on May 1st, the Minnesota River at Jordan reached 18-feet – the level where our flying site starts to be inundated with river water. But then May was rainy most of the month and the water remained on our field. And then June arrived!!!! June is usually a wet month with an expected 4-inches of rainfall. Well not June 2024! The State experienced over 17-inches of rainfall for the month, and not only did the water remain over our field, it crested on June 28th at an historic level of 35.12-feet, just breaking the almost 60-year-old record of 35.1-feet set way back on April 11, 1965! Since that time, the River has receded to 32.1-feet on July 1st.

As of July 1st, the National Water Prediction Service (NWPS) has projected the River level decline through July 8, 2024. If it were to continue to recede at that rate, our flying site would not emerge from the water until July 28th. Historically, July's average rainfall over the last 30-years has been 4-inches. Optimistically, if we do get an average July rainfall this year, the Minnesota River level

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will drop faster and possibly we could see the field around July 21st.

However, the field does need time to dry out before the club can schedule a clean-up date. And with the record amount of water that has been on the field for three months, there will be a lot of silt and debris to be removed. The officers will keep the membership informed as to when we can reclaim the field and schedule a clean-up.

It does seem to be quite a hardship to lose our flying site for almost three months, and of course it is very much a hardship. But let us put this in perspective. We own the 40 acres that the field sits on free and clear. The land is actually zoned to allow full-size airplanes. We do not have or need a Conditional Use Permit to fly our R/C airplanes. (We do have a Conditional Use Permit to have a shelter on the land.) The land to the east, west and north is river bottom, and no building or development can ever occur, so no new housing developments can be built.

We have seen Tri-Valley RC in Rosemount, a long-time club of 200+ members lose their flying site, we have seen Minnesota Valley club in Shakopee, another 200+ member club lose their flying site, and just recently SodBusters, a large club that has been around a very long time, lose their flying site. This cannot happen to TCRC! We are truly blessed. So, if we lose the ability to use our beautiful flying site for a period of time now and then because of Mother Nature, that still seems a small price to pay to know that our existence cannot be taken away from us! Add to that we have a nice alternative flying site at the Scott County Fairgrounds to fly

at during those times that the Jordan Field is not available.

So, don't dwell on the temporary loss of the Jordan flying site. Do some flying at the Fairgrounds, and when the Minnesota River releases its grip on Jordan, join the rest of the club as we restore our field to the beautiful model aircraft park that we love.

The Electric Fly and Competition schedule for the morning of June 15th had to be cancelled because of heavy rains.



DeBreyere C-1

The June Mystery Plane was the French DeBreyere C-1



One of the most unorthodox single-seat fighters built during WWI, was the extraordinary pusher biplane with canard configuration.

A single-bay biplane, with inverted N-type struts, rotary tip ailerons on the upper wings, with fixed canard surface, and dorsal and ventral surfaces at the rear. It was powered by a 150-horsepower engine in the center fuselage. The fuselage was a light metal shell, and a nose wheel undercarriage was added. It had stern-mounted propeller via a long extension shaft.

No records have survived to indicate the reason for these arrangements, but it could have been the desire to carry a 37mm cannon. First flight was made in August 1917. The aircraft became airborne but rolled over and crashed (not surprising). No attempt was made to repair it and continue the flight testing. No further details have been found.


This single-seat fighter had a wingspan of 36-feet. It was powered with a Hispano-Siza 9-cylinder watercooled engine that developed 150 horsepower.


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Dave Andersen Published In Two Magazines
